Description	American History 10 describes the history of the American people after Reconstruction to the present. The individuals and groups that have contributed to the development of American culture will be studied. The impact of industrialization, urbanization, and political and social conflicts on individuals and groups of various times in our history will be examined. Students will consider how changes in American life have affected policies as well as the impact on future generations.

Homework Policy and Philosophy	<p>*All homework is to be completed by the due date. All packets are due on review day.</p> <p>*Completion of all assignments that are assigned individual points is mandatory. Simply not doing an assignment is not an option. The marking period grade will be in "I" until assignments are complete. (See Student Handbook for Incomplete Grades).</p> <p>*Should you be absent from class, obtaining assignments and turning in assignments are your responsibility.</p> <p>*Assignments for excused absences will be turned in on the due date or the penalty applies.</p> <p>*Students on a pre-approved trip/field trip of one period, one day, or multiple days should request assignments <u>before leaving</u> on the trip. The due date for assignments applies if you are in school at any time even though you may not be in class.</p> <p>*Work not turned in or not completed results in a zero, incomplete, or failure. Incomplete homework will result in a 5 point deduction per assignment from the homework grade for the first two missed assignments, followed by a 10 point deduction thereafter. Once homework points are at zero, each additional assignment will be assessed a 10 point value added to the total of the homework grade.</p> <p>*Cheating results in an automatic 10 point deduction.</p>
